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# 1 General information

The 7270 LAN board is a Network Time Server (*abbr.* NTS) for **hopf** GPS and DCF77 19" or. ½ 19" (3HE) racks - System 7001, 6842 and 6855.

It can be used for synchronizing the PC or SPS networks with the accurate time and can be installed at any point in the network.


The 7270 LAN board is available with network interface 10 Base-T or 10/100 Base-T.

The board supports the world wide used time protocol NTP as well as the special industrial Ethernet protocol SINEC H1.

The configuration of the 7270 LAN board is via the keypad of the **hopf** System 7001, 6842 or 6855. A remote control configuration of the network setting of the 7270 LAN board via Ethernet with Telnet is possible as well as remote control via SNMP.








# X1 (9-pole SUB-D connector)




## X2 (RJ-45 bush, with shield, 10/100 Base-T connector)

## 3 Setting of the 7270 LAN board

The configuration of the 7270 LAN board with the required network parameters, such as IP address, gateway address, netmask and a general control byte, is via the keypad of systems 6855, 6842, 7001GPS or DCF77.

The corresponding descriptions of the above-mentioned base systems is presupposed for configuration. The following explanation deals with the input of the values found in the menu item "SET" or "SETZEN". In the illustrations the format of the English illustration is used:

Please Note:

**PLEASE NOTE:** AFTER SETTING ALL THE LAN SPECIFIC ITEMS IN THE CORRESPONDING MENU, THIS MUST BE LEFT AFTER LAST USING THE **"ENT"** KEY BY PRESSING **"BR"**. ONLY THEN THE INFORMATION IS TRANSMITTED TO THE APPROPRIATE LAN BOARD.

## 3.1 Input functions 6842/6855

A maximum of two 7270 LAN boards can be used in this system.

## 3.1.1 IP address

The IP address is entered via the following selection picture:

SET LAN 1 or SET LAN 2 ADR. Y/N ADR. Y/N

After entering (Y)es the following will appear in the display:

LAN 1 >

Now the IP address can be entered in four groups of three decimal figures from 0 to 255. This must be made in three digits (e.g. :  $9 \Rightarrow 009$ ). After three figures have been entered a point (.) will automatically appear. The last group will be limited by a left arrow (<). The input must be completed with (**ENT**)er.

A completed entry appears, for example, as follows:

LAN 1 >192.168 017.001<

The example also repeats the pre-set IP address 192.168.017.001 as the ex-works setting.

Please Note: IN 6842/6855 SYSTEMS WITH TWO LAN BOARDS THE PARAMETRES FOR EACH BOARD MUST BE ENTERED AND TRANSMITTED SEPARATELY.



## 3.1.2 Input of gateway address

The gateway address is entered via the following selection of commands:

SET LAN 1 or SET LAN 2

GATEWAY ADR. Y/N GATEWAY ADR. Y/N

After entering (**Y**)es the following will appear in the display:

LAN 1 >

The gateway address can only be entered in the same form as the IP address.

The last group will be limited by a left arrow ( < ). Input must be completed with (ENT)er.

## 3.1.3 Input of netmask

The netmask is entered via the following selection of commands:

SET LAN 1 or SET LAN 2 NET-MASK Y/N NET-MASK Y/N

After entering (Y)es the following will appear in the display:

NET-MASK LAN 1 or NET-MASK LAN 2

The netmask can be entered in the range from **0...31**. The last group will be limited by a left arrow ( < ). Input must be completed with (**ENT**)er.

## 3.1.4 Input of control byte

Various settings can be made with the control byte.

The control byte is entered via the following selection of commands:

SET LAN 1 or SET LAN 2

CNTRL.-BYTE Y/N CNTRL.-BYTE Y/N

After entering (Y)es the following will appear in the display:

BIT 7654 3210

>

Only a "0" or a "1" can be entered in the second line for the individual bits.

e.g.: **BIT 7654 3210 0000 0010** 

Input must be completed with (ENT)er.

The description of the individual functions in the control byte can be found in section 3.3.



## 3.2 Input functions of System 7001

Up to eight 7270 LAN boards can be configured with the system 7001GPS/DCF77. Input and display functions are called up with the menu item **LAN = 6**. The start display appears:

A figure between 1-8 must be entered.

## 3.2.1 Input IP address

When the board number is entered (board identification) the display changes to the **SET** menu for the IP address.

```
BOARD --> 1 <-- IP-ADR. > 192.168.017.001 < NEW INPUT WITH "Y" >_
```

In the upper line the board identification appears as entered with the IP address which is currently set. In order to enter a new address the input (Y)es is required.

Now the IP address is entered in four groups of three decimal figures from 0 to 255, each with a point (.) to separate the groups of figures or three decimal figures. Input is in three digits (e.g.:  $9 \Rightarrow 009$ ). After the three figures have been entered a point (.) must set.

The IP address must be entered as follows, e.g.:

```
BOARD --> 1 <-- IP-ADR. > 192.168.017.001 < NEW INPUT WITH "Y" > 192.168.017.001 <
```

After the last group of figures there is a left arrow (<). Input is completed with (ENT)er. The new address is shown in the upper line. If there is an error during input, the menu is left and an error message will be shown.

Please Note: IF ANY OTHER FIGURE OR LETTER IS USED EXCEPT "Y" AND "BR" THE MENU ITEMS CONTINUE IN SEQUENCE FOR THE BOARD SET.

## 3.2.2 Input of gateway address

The next menu item to be shown is editing the gateway or router address.

```
BOARD --> 1 <-- GW-ADR. > 191.124.010.001 < NEW INPUT WITH "Y" > _
```

The gateway address can now be entered in the same way as the IP address in section 3.2.1.



## 3.2.3 Input of netmask

If any other figure or letter is entered except "Y" and "BR" the menu items continue in sequence for the board set. Editing of the netmask then appears as the next menu item. To calculate the netmask the number of bits for the host part is entered. The range is from 0... 31. The following appears in the display:

A figure between **0...31** must be entered. The input is completed by pressing (**ENT**)er. The new netmask appears in the upper line. When an input error is made the menu item is left and an error message will be shown.

#### 3.2.4 Input of control bytes

Various settings can be made with the control byte.

The control byte is entered via the following selection of commands:

After entering (Y)es a "0" or a"1" for the individual bits can be entered in the second line. The input is completed with (ENT)er. The new control byte appears in the upper line. When an input error is made, the menu item is left and an error message will be shown.

## 3.3 Control byte

Various functions can be activated via the control byte, e.g. time basis, NTP protocol, SINEC H1 protocol with corresponding parameter.

The bits indicate the following:

**<u>Bit 7</u>** = **0** standard setting (Must not be changed!)

**Bit 6** = **0** output of **NTP** protocol

1 output of SINEC H1 protocol

## 3.4 System bus setting

With switch **7** in the DIP switch block (**DS1**) a selection can be made between the bus of system 7001 and the bus of the boards (systems) 6855 / 6842. These settings should only be made by qualified staff.

## 3.5 Setting the board identification

Two 7270 LAN boards can be addressed by the systems 6855, 6842 and eight 7270 LAN boards can be addressed by the system 7001GPS/DCF77. The board identification is set in DIP switch block (**DS1**) with the switches 1-4. These settings should only be made by qualified staff.

#### 3.6 Minute pulse

A potential free minute pulse of 12V DC is distributed on a 9 pole SUB-D connector. The length of the pulse can be adjusted in 4 steps. The pulse lengths are set via the DIP switch block (**DS1**) as follows:

N0.: 6 No.: 5 Pu		Pulse length
on	on	10 msec
on	off	100 msec
off	on	500 msec
off	off	1000 msec

The output is an "open emitter" with a current limiter to 20 mA. The external pull down load must be in a range of 120 to 600 Ohm.

Please Note: A RESISTOR GREATER THE 600 OHM WILL INCREASE THE RISE/FALL TIME OF THE PULSE.

## 3.7 Remote configuration of the network parameters via Telnet

The network parameters of the 7270 LAN board can also be configured via Ethernet with a *Telnet*- compatible programme via *TCP Port 9999*. The setting of the time basis for the corresponding output protocol NTP or SINEC H1 is only possible via a system keypad.

To use the configuration via Telnet the configuration via the system keypad of the radio-controlled clock should not be used. This is activated with **switch no.: 8** in the position **OFF** DIP switch block 2 (**DS2**).

<u>Please Note:</u> WITH REMOTE CONFIGURATION THE INFORMATION WHICH APPEARS IN THE SYSTEM DISPLAY OF THE RADIO-CONTOLLED CLOCK IS NOT UPDATED.

## 3.8 Remote monitoring via SNMP (read modus)

For further information regarding the set-up of applications with remote monitoring via SNMP please contact **hopf** Elektronik.

#### 3.9 NTP

The 7270 LAN board is a network time server (Network Time Server, NTS). This supports **NTP** versions 1, 2, 3 und 4.

The 7270 LAN board provides comprehensive support for SNTP (Simple NTP).



# 4 LED Status and error messages

In the front panel are 5 LEDs for status or error messages.

Status of the **Send** LED:

LED flickers: Standard, access to the internal bus is indicated

LED on: Error on the board

LED off: Error on another board. No further bus access is possible.

## **Light-emitting diodes 1-4**

Ethernet interface status LEDs:

LED 1 on	LED 2 off	Board 7270 is synchronised with a valid time string from base system. Base system is radio-synchronised
LED 1 off	LED <b>2</b> flashes	Synchronisation of board 7270 with time string from base system has a failure or base system is not radio-synchronised
LED 3 flashes:		reserved
LED 3 off:		reserved
LED 4 on:		Network connection via RJ45 connector exists
LED 4 off:		No network connection (e.g. cable is faulty or wrong)



# 5 Glossary

#### Network IP address

An IP address is a 32-bit value divided into four 8-bit figures. The standard presentation is in 4 decimal digits (in the range 0...255) separated from each other with dots (*Dotted Quad Notation*).

Example: 192.2.1.123

The IP address consists of a leading network ID and then the host ID. In order to satisfy different requirements 4 common network classifications have been defined. Depending on the network classification the last one, two or three bytes define the host, while the remaining define the network (the network ID).

In the following text the "x" stands for the host part of the IP address.

#### Class A networks

IP address 1.xxx.xxx.xxx to 127.xxx.xxx.xxx

In this classification there are max. 127 different networks. This means that there are a very high number of host systems which can be connected (max. 16.777.216).

Example: 100.0.0.1, (network 100, host 0.0.1)

#### Class B networks

IP address 128.0.xxx.xxx to 191.255.xxx.xxx

This class consists of a maximum of 32768 networks. Each of these networks can be made up of up to 65534 host systems.

Example: 172.1.3.2 (network 172.1, host 3.2)

#### Class C networks

IP address 192.0.0.xxx to 223.255.255.xxx

These network addresses are the most common. Up to 256 host systems can be connected.

#### Class D networks

The addresses of 224.xxx.xxx.xxx -239.xxx.xxx are used as multi-cast addresses.



#### **Exceptions**

- No address is permitted which sets the 4 highest valued bits at 1-1-1-1.
   (240.xxx.xxx.xxx 254.xxx.xxx). These addresses are classified as Class E and are reserved.
- The host address where all the bits are set at "0" is used to address the network as a whole (e.g. with routing entries)
- The host part address where all bits are set at "1" is the broadcast address. This means that every station is being addressed.
- Network and broadcast addresses may not be used as host addresses.

e.g. 192.168.0.0 indicates the whole network 192.168.0.255 indicates the broadcast address

#### **Broadcast address**

The IP address is used for addressing all hosts in a network. As a rule this address corresponds to the network ID and the value 255 for each part of the host part of the IP address (e.g. 149.202.255.255 stands for all hosts in class B networks 149.202.0.0).

#### Gateway address

The gateway or router address is required to be able to communicate with other network segments. The standard gateway must be set to the router address which connects these segments. The address must be located within the local network.

#### Netmask

The netmask is used to divide up the IP addresses outside the network classifications A,B,C. By entering the netmask it is possible to indicate how many bits of the IP address are to be used as a network part and how many as a host part, e.g.:

Standard class A 8 Bit network 24 Bit Host part netmask 255.0.0.0
Standard class B 16 Bit network 16 Bit Host part netmask 255.255.0.0
Standard class C 24 Bit network 8 Bit Host part netmask 255.255.255.0.0

To calculate the netmask the number of bits for the host part is entered:

e.g.: netmask Input host Bits 255.255.255.128 (FF FF F80) 7 255.0.0.0 (FF 00 00 00) 24

#### **MAC address**

Media Access Control address is a non-changeable 8 Byte hardware address of a network board.

#### SINEC H1

Special Ethernet time protocol for industrial applications

#### NTP

Network Time Protocol, a network time protocol for synchronizing networks.

#### **SNTP**

Simple Network Time Protocol
